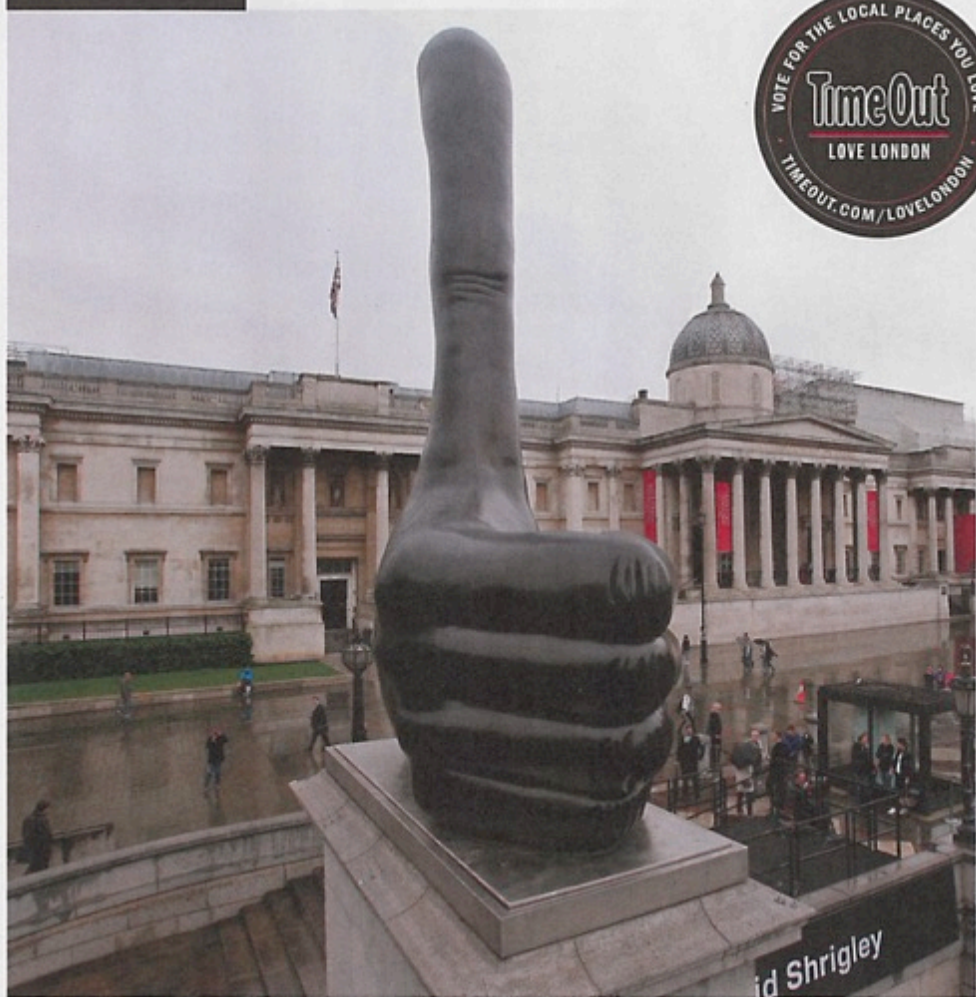
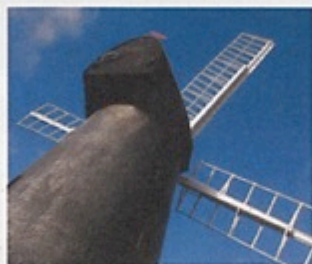

This week is a big week for big art. Trafalgar Square has just unveiled its cheeriest ever commission for the Fourth Plinth: David Shrigley's huge thumbs-up to London. Tate Modern's Turbine Hall has been filled with inflatable fish, bacteria, sounds and flashing lights (p70). And the art world is descending on Regent's Park where Frieze art fair kicks off on Thursday. But London's art is something we should be proud of any week of the year. It's spectacular, it's a culture-magnet for the rest of the world, and it's mostly freely available for everyone to see. ### Scented toilet paper

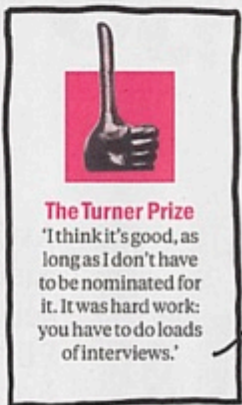
'I have no opinion about scented toilet paper.'
